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About Misa

Misa was founded in 1994 and consists today of several units specializing in different disabilities. We are active throughout the whole Stockholm region, as well as in Skåne, Uppsala and Västerås. The name Misa is a Swedish-language acronym for method development, individual support, community development and work-orientation. In addition, Misa offers competence-enhancing education for municipalities, organizations and corporations. We conduct educational efforts throughout all of Sweden and also in the other Nordic countries. Our aim is to help people with disabilities make the transition into the world of work.

How we work

Provided with the right kind of support, people with disabilities will be able to participate in the labor market. A job gives status and a chance to partake of normal social life. The social aspect is of great importance. Having a job also means regular routines and a chance to contribute one's skills and abilities.

We draw upon the individual's skills and interests in order to find a workplace that well suits the person's needs. We are always at hand to offer additional support should problems arise at the workplace. In concert with the employer and the individual, we continually evaluate the support we provide and follow up on developments and progress.

We use the ISA method, which stands for individual support at the workplace. The person will receive the support he or she needs through a safe and supportive relationship so that he or she can carry out the tasks as independently as possible. At times, this support may involve developing clear instructions that makes the job easier. In other cases, it may be that the individual depends on social support to be able to develop a good relationship with his or her colleagues. Thanks to the ISA method, ordinary jobs are made available to everyone.
